Title: Cosmetology/Barbering Concepts

This course covers principles and practices of hygiene, ethics, bacteriology, sanitation, hair disorders, permanent waving, haircoloring, chemicals, relaxing, pressing, and wigs.

Justification:

This course is required by the State Cosmetology Board to prepare students in cosmetology/barbering theory and practices.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- demonstrate an understanding of the guidelines for a healthy body and personality
- demonstrate an understanding of communication skills and professional ethics
- know bacteria types and how they relate to the cause of disease
- know which methods of sanitation to use to properly sterilize implements
- understand hair, its composition, structure, color, and life cycle
- recognize hair, skin, and nail diseases and disorders commonly seen in salons
- know reasons for cleansing and conditioning hair
- demonstrate all haircutting procedures and techniques
- define all phases of hairstyling--thermal and physical
- understand all procedures and techniques of permanent waving
- demonstrate correct procedures for coloring, including consultation, analysis, law of color, selection, and application
- define the purpose of chemical hair relaxing and know the proper cautions, procedures, and techniques

- know the purpose, procedures, and precautions of hair pressing
- list reasons people wear wigs or hair pieces
- know types of hair pieces and how to fit, style, color, and cut them
- know first aid for minor cuts, blood spills, burns, customer injuries, and situations that require Emergency Medical Services notification
- use various esthetic manipulative procedures to improve and correct skin conditions
- know the proper color selection for a regular application and corrective color
- know all the safety measures for all techniques used on our industry
- know how to care for and maintain artificial hair pieces
- demonstrate haircutting for men and women
- use the various esthetic procedures
- use proper massage techniques using hand and electrical apparatuses to improve and correct skin condition
- demonstrate all applications for nail enhancements.

Content:

Course objectives will be accomplished by providing students with learning experiences in the following subject areas:

- maintaining a healthy body and mind
- how bacteria affects health of the individual
- how to properly sanitize all implements
- analysis of hair so that services are performed
- cleansing and conditioning of hair
- proper haircutting procedures
- using hairstyling to balance the face and body structure
- perming hair to achieve proper results
- haircoloring to achieve desired color
- color correction
- proper selection of relaxer to achieve optimum results
- how to apply, test, and remove relaxer
- how bonds change during a chemical relaxer
- how to properly press hair without damaging the hair
- selecting and fitting a wig
- proper cleaning, conditioning, and maintenance of hair pieces
- proper application of nail enhancements
- using electric currents and hand manipulations to perform massage techniques in preventative and corrective facials
- proper makeup applications for maintenance and corrective techniques
- recognizing skin, hair, and nail disorders
- using various esthetic procedures
- barber and style cutting
- fitting and caring of artificial hair pieces
- safety measures for all techniques in nails, facials, coloring, cutting, and chemical relaxing
- color selection and procedures for corrective haircolors

- use of first aid techniques for cuts, blood spills, burns, and other emergencies.

Key Performance Indicators:

In class:

- Students are tested orally on an ongoing basis. Written tests are given on major subject areas.
- Courses 1110, 1112, 1113 are combined series. Students will be graded based on their performance in all three classes. Written tests on major subject areas make up 20% - 30% of grade, and practical grades in all subject areas consist of 70% - 80% of student grades.

Following class:

- After completion of the course, competency will be measured by success in subsequent courses and by passing the state license exam.
