Title: Cosmetology/Barbering Concepts Practicum A

Catalog Description:

Lab instruction and practice are an integral part of this program. This course provides practical experience with shampooing, scalp treatments, manicuring, pedicuring, application of nail enhancements, haircutting, hairstyling, permanent waving, facials, esthetic procedures, massaging, trichology, care and styling of wigs and wiglets, finger waving, haircoloring, and bleaching.

Justification:

This course is required by the State Cosmetology Board to prepare students in cosmetology/barbering theory and practices. This course will give the practical experiences necessary.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Upon completion of this course, students will gain knowledge and become more proficient in:

- demonstrating all applications for nail enhancements
- using proper massage techniques, using hand and electrical apparatuses, to improve and correct skin condition
- demonstrating proper makeup applications for maintenance and corrective makeup
- recognizing skin, hair, and nail diseases and disorders by their symptoms, both objective and subjective
- using the various esthetic procedures
- demonstrate haircutting for men and women
- knowing how to care and maintain artificial hair pieces
- knowing all the safety measures for all techniques used in our industry as it relates to nails, facials, coloring, cutting, and chemical relaxing

- knowing the proper color selection for a regular application and corrective color
- knowing procedures of all artificial nail enhancements
- knowing first aid for minor cuts, blood spills, burns, customer injuries, and situations that require Emergency Medical Services notification
- using various esthetic manipulative procedures to improve and correct skin conditions
- communication skills
- permanent waving
- hair analysis
- chemical relaxing
- facials
- manicuring and pedicuring.

Content:

Course objectives will be accomplished by providing students with learning experiences in the following subject areas:

- sanitation procedures
- proper draping
- client consultation prior to services
- step-by-step manicuring and pedicuring
- establishing condition and competency of the hair
- brushing and shampooing prior to services
- perming
- proper color selection
- recognizing scalp disorders
- relaxing overly curly hair
- fitting wigs and hair pieces.

General Education Outcomes:

3) Speak effectively in a variety of contexts.

Students communicate with clients regarding desired outcomes and expectations. Effective speaking and listening skills are critical for success in the cosmetology profession.

6) Apply computational skills to a variety of contexts.

Students will be able to precisely measure and mix solutions in the chemical application of hair products.

7) Apply scientific reasoning to a variety of contexts.

Students will learn the "Law of Color" as it applies to hair coloring and the effect of pH levels on hair condition.

Students will learn to communicate with clients in an ethical fashion when arriving at style/coloring decisions.

9) Respond with informed sensitivity to an artistic work or experience.

Students will learn to appreciate and critique styles, cuts, coloring, and textures based on current trends and appropriate application.

Key Performance Indicators:

In class:

- Students are graded on practical application of theoretical skills as these are practiced on mannequins or clients.
- Successful completion of competencies is verified by instructor.
- Courses 1110, 1112, 1113 are combined series. Students will be graded based on their performance in all three classes. Written tests on major subject areas make up 20% - 30% of grade, and practical grades in all subject areas consist of 70% - 80% of student grades.

Following class:

- After completion of the course, competency will be measured by success in subsequent courses and by passing the state license exam.
