Title: Cosmetology/Barbering Principles Practicum

Catalog Description:

Lab instruction and practice are an integral part of this program. This course covers principles and practices of manicuring, pedicuring, nail diseases and disorders, massage, facials, facial makeup, skin and its disorders and diseases, and removal of unwanted hair by tweezing and waxing.

Justification:

This course is required by the State Cosmetology Board to prepare students in cosmetology/barbering theory and practices.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will:

- learn the different types of braiding: invisible braids, rope braids, fishtail braids, and corn rowing
- be familiar with the different types of hair extensions
- learn the differences between human hair and synthetic wigs
- learn the procedure for measuring wigs to fit a person and the proper procedure for putting on a wig
- know how to analyze hair to determine the proper chemical texture service to be used
- know and understand the various types of permanent waving solutions and the different perm wrapping procedures
- understand the procedure for chemical hair relaxing and soft curl permanents
- learn the principles of color theory and know the basic application of colors
- learn the function and structure of the skin and know which skin disorders may be handled in the salon and which should be referred to a physician
- identify acceptable techniques involved in the methods of permanent hair removal

- demonstrate the procedure and manipulative skills used in facials and know the beneficial effects of a facial
- know the different types of cosmetics and their uses and understand basic makeup procedures for any occasion
- understand the structure and composition of nails, how nails grow, and know the various disorders and diseases of the nails
- demonstrate a plain manicure and pedicure
- know the proper use of implements, cosmetics, and materials used in manicuring and pedicuring
- identify the five basic nail shapes
- know how to perform the basic procedures for applying tips, wraps, acrylic nails, and gels
- list the safety precautions that must be followed when applying artificial nails
- know the factors to consider when opening a salon and the types of ownership under which a salon may operate
- know the importance of keeping accurate business records, good salon telephone techniques, effective forms of salon advertising and proper salon management
- learn about different types of salon businesses
- write a resume, prepare an employment portfolio, and complete an effective employment interview
- learn how to be a good employee
- know the three different ways in which salon professionals are compensated
- create a personal budget and learn the most effective way to build a client base
- further develop all skills pertaining to cosmetology, barbering, nail technology, and esthetics.

Content:

Course objectives will be accomplished by providing students with learning experiences in the following subject areas:

- differences between human hair and synthetic wigs and the proper way of measuring and fitting wigs
- how to consult with clients to determine their needs as it relates to texture and chemical relaxing services; demonstrate basic wrapping and application procedures for these services
- principles of color theory and the different applications of color
- structure and composition of the skin
- terms relating to skin disorders and diseases
- methods of permanent and temporary hair removal
- types of massage and their physiological effects when giving a facial
- different types of electrical current used in facial treatments and the safety precautions that must be followed
- different facial types and demonstrate basic makeup procedure for any occasion
- structure and composition of nails
- disorders and diseases of the nail
- proper use of implements, cosmetics, and materials used in manicuring and pedicuring
- massage techniques used when giving a manicure or pedicure
- preservice and postservice steps of an artificial nail procedure
- basic procedures for applying tips, wraps, acrylic nails, and gels
- factors to consider when opening and running a successful beauty salon
- steps involved in preparing for employment

- factors and qualities needed to succeed as a new employee in a service profession.

General Education Outcomes:

3) Speak effectively in a variety of contexts.

Students communicate with clients regarding desired outcomes and expectations. Effective speaking and listening skills are critical for success in the cosmetology profession.

6) Apply computational skills to a variety of contexts.

Students will be able to precisely calculate, measure, and mix solutions in the chemical application of hair products.

Applied Education Outcomes:

1) Students will acquire entry-level skills specific to and appropriate for employment in their chosen field of study.

Upon completion of the basic class, students will work on clients, performing all cosmetology and barbering techniques which will prepare them for employment in this field.

2) Students will become aware of industry specific certification and develop skills sufficient to acquire the same.

Upon completion of the program, all students are required to take a state practical and written exam which is necessary for licensure. Both state exams must be passed at 75%

3) Students will demonstrate safe practices and awareness of potential hazards in their field of expertise.

A portion of the student's grade is based upon sanitation. This involves how clean the students keeps their station. Also using proper sanitation techniques on the client. The students have basic chemistry classes helping them to understand what ingredients are in the products they use.

4) Students will demonstrate interpersonal skills specific to the skills and environment inherent in their field.

The interpersonal skills are developed as the student works with other students and learns to communicate with the clients they work on. Developing these skills are essential in order to be successful in this profession.

Key Performance Indicators:

In class:

- Students are tested orally on an ongoing basis. Written tests are given on major subject areas.
- Students will be graded based on their performance. Written tests on major subject areas make up

20% - 30% of grade, and practical grades in all subject areas consist of 70% - 80% of student grades.

Following class:

- After completion of the course, competency will be measured by success in subsequent courses and by passing the state license exam.
