Title: Apparel Construction Techniques

Students use home sewing machines and sergers to construct at least four projects. Sewn articles may be clothing or items for other uses. A variety of techniques will be demonstrated in class.

This course is required by Clothing and Textiles majors as well as by Family and Consumer Science Education majors. It transfers as a required course to Utah State University (FCSE 2040) and Southern Utah University (FLHD 2220).

- select fabrics and notions to complete as least four textile projects
- learn to appreciate the intrinsic value of personally designed clothing and textiles, and the skill it takes to make them.

This course will include:

- Equipment and Supplies

 - pattern, fabric, and notion selection
- Alteration and Fitting
- Construction Techniques
 - basic sewing
 - sleeves

- facings
- band type collars, cuffs or waistbands
- zippers
- hems
- Special Applications
 - sewing for the home
 - wardrobe accessories
 - gifts
 - sewing shortcuts
