Title: MUSIC HISTORY AND LITERATURE I

Catalog Description:

This is an entry level course for music majors and an elective course for those desiring a comprehensive background in music literature. It will cover music throughout history and the relationship of music to the other arts. This course includes the chronological study of music from Antiquity through the Classical period.

Offered for Non-Credit: No

Justification:

This course is a necessary prerequisite for the music-major transferring to a four year program at any of the State's four year universities. It also fulfills a general education requirement for the non-music major. Similar music history and literature courses are offered by other schools accredited by the National Association of Schools of Music.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Students will be able to write clearly and informatively about various music history topics. Students will be able to identify aural musical examples by placing them in a specific musical time period.

Content:

Course content will include the study of a music history text, musical scores, and audio examples. The course will focus on the major style periods, influential composers, and music's role in human culture. This course includes the chronological study of music from Antiquity through the Classical period.

General Education Outcomes:

2) Write clearly, informatively, and persuasively.

Students write weekly papers on music history topics. The papers are reviewed and edited by two classmates.

Revisions are made and papers are then submitted. Following corrections by the instructor, students are encouraged to share ideas and corrected aspects with the two students who edited the paper.

9) Respond with informed sensitivity to an artistic work or experience.

Using a score anthology, students listen to music CDs that accompany material in the class text. Listening quizzes are then administered four times during the course of the semester. After hearing a short portion of a musical work, students are required to write the name of the composition and composer. Students also write weekly papers that discuss musical aspects of these same works.
