**Title:** Art Majors Seminar II

**Catalog Description:**

This capstone course is designed for sophomore art majors who will transfer to a four-year visual arts program. This course will examine many professional practices and aesthetic concerns within the visual arts. Emphasis will be directed to the development of critical analysis skills (critiques), idea formation, work ethic, oral presentation skills, and portfolio preparation. (Required of all art majors)

**Justification:**

This course will better prepare outgoing sophomore art majors for careers as continuing students at a four-year institution and/or as professional artists.

This course is offered in a similar format at most colleges and universities in the state: Art 2070 Art Majors Seminar -- three credits (Dixie State College); Art 290 Art Seminar --0-0.5 cr/semester (BYU-Idaho University); Art 1170 Art Theory and Analysis -- three credits (Utah State University)

**Student Learning Outcomes:**

Upon successful completion of this course, students will:

- organize a cohesive body of work (portfolio) and document it in digital format, a copy of which will be cataloged in the Department of Visual Arts library as an assessment and recruitment tool.
- create his or her own frames, mat and glaze two-dimensional works and learn proper presentation techniques for three-dimensional works.
- understand the mechanics of curating, hanging and, lighting a professional art exhibition in a gallery space.
- understand how and be able to prepare, critique, and present two professional oral presentations of art-related subjects.
- create a comprehensive curriculum vita cataloging his or her accomplishments thus far.
- create two works of art independently from direct art instruction and present them during oral critiques with peers.

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- make contact and application to the school which they wish to transfer.

### **Content:**

This course will include:

- critical thinking and evaluation (oral group critiques)
- idea formation and work ethic
- careers options within the field of visual arts
- development of an artist statement, r sum , transfer school applications, and scholarships applications
- portfolio organization
- matting and framing (presentation)
- documentation of artwork (digital photography)
- professional gallery practices
- field trips to art centers/galleries
- two oral presentations on various art-related subjects
- the creation of at least two works of art.

### **General Education Outcomes:**

1) Read effectively, constructively, and critically.

Each student will be required to read the textbook and be able to retrieve information pertaining to professional practices as artists. Students will also be required to read various art-related articles and respond to them critically in group discussions.

2) Write clearly, informatively, and persuasively.

As part of this course sophomore art majors will be required to create a curriculum vita and a written artists statement critically discussing their own artwork and how it has evolved while attending Snow College.

3) Speak effectively in a variety of contexts.

Students will be expected to participate in verbal critiques of their own work and the work of their peers. A component of this course will include teaching students effective and dynamic methods of oral presentation. Each student will be required to deliver two lectures: one on their own work and one on the work of a contemporary. Both presentations will include the use of visual aids, utilizing digital images and Power Point software. Each presentation will be critiqued by the instructor to help improve the success of the second presentation.

9) Respond with informed sensitivity to an artistic work or experience.

This is a capstone course for art majors who have completed major requirements within the Snow College Department of Visual Art. Each student completing this course, along with the culmination of his or her college art training, should be able to look at any work of art and respond to it subjectively and objectively to appreciate it for its formal and conceptual qualities.

### **Key Performance Indicators:**

Each student will be evaluated on the following assignments:

- organize and document (slides and/or digital images) a cohesive body of work: 20% of the final grade.
- make application to a transfer institution: 5% of the final grade.
- create a current resume /curriculum vita and artist statement: 10% of the final grade.
- mid-term outside of class work of art: 15% of the final grade.
- enter work and assist with professional gallery practices by hanging and lighting the Snow College Student Art Exhibition: 5% of the final grade.
- conduct 2 oral presentations on various art-related topics: 30% of the final grade.
- final outside of class work of art: 15% of the final grade.
