Title: MUSIC HISTORY AND LITERATURE I

Catalog Description:

This is an upper division course designed to provide declared music majors with an in-depth study of music history. This course includes the chronological study of music from Antiquity through the Baroque period, and the relationship of music to the other arts.

Prerequisites: Music Theory II (MUSC 1130) and Expository Composition (ENGL 1010)

Justification:

This course is required for all music majors pursuing a Bachelor of Music degree at Snow College and is a necessary prerequisite for students transferring to another four year program at any of the state's universities. It also fulfills a Fine Arts general education requirement for music majors. The Horne School of Music at Snow College is an accredited member of The National Association of Schools of Music (NASM).

Student Learning Outcomes:

Students will write papers that reflect a basic knowledge of music history. Students will be able to identify audio examples of music literature.

Content:

Course content will include the study of a music history text, musical scores, and audio examples. The course will focus on the major styles, influential composers, and music's role in human culture. This course includes the chronological study of music from Antiquity through the Baroque period.

General Education Outcomes:

2) Write clearly, informatively, and persuasively.

Students write papers on music history topics. The papers are reviewed and edited, and feedback provided by classmates and/or the instructor. Revisions are made and papers are then submitted.

9) Respond with informed sensitivity to an artistic work or experience.

Using a score anthology, students listen to music that accompanies material in the class text. Listening quizzes are then administered during the course of the semester. After hearing a short portion of a musical work, students are required to write the name of the composition and composer. Students also write papers that discuss musical aspects of these same works. Students will receive instructor feedback on papers and via quiz and test results.

Key Performance Indicators:

Students will be graded on the following criteria: writing assignments (30%), tests (50%), and listening quizzes (20%). Percentages are approximate.
